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EPIC STORY OF FAMOUS "PIONEERS"

Excerpts from this article have been reproduced using a Kyogle newspaper published 9th July 1943 and sent to us by Mavis Blanch, widow of the Ray "Joe" Blanch mentioned in

This is a story of 18 boys from Kyogle. The story of boys who, torn by war from peaceful homes, became such soldiers that not only Kyogle. but the world could be proud of. Inextricably woven with their story is the epic story of their battalion, now an integral part of the history of the A.I.F.

The Kyogle boys were posted to 2/1st Pioneer Battalion. To the layman this doesn't mean much. "Pioneer Battalion" he says to himself and imagines a lot of men digging. Yes, the pioneer is a digger all right, But he is infinitely much more. He is the jack-of-all trades of the army. Must you move a cargo in the middle of a bombing raid? The pioneers will do it. Do you want a bridge built — a bridge destroyed — trenches dug — barbed wire entanglements? The pioneers can do all these jobs and many others.

But do you want a soldier who can fight on, as well as build a road or dig a hole? That IS a pioneer. Their battalion was no exception.

Among the many Kyogle boys who sailed

with the unit was a group who had already brought soldierly fame to the district. Between them they had formed part of the crack troop, of the 15th Light Horse, which trained in the district in days of peace. But their fame went further than that, for as well as being the crack troops of their regiment, they were also the crack Vickers machine gun team of all Australia.

Nowhere in Australia was there a betterdrilled Vickers troop and there were none to beat them as marksmen or in stripping their guns. They also won the Beaver Cup for five years in succession. The men in that team in the battalion were: Lieut. Ray Smith, Lieut. Leo Ferris, Sgt. Albert Brown, Privates Brian Gray, Jack Boyd, Bruce McNaughton, Marshall ("Scotch") Aitken, Tom Welch, Ray Blanch and Jack McMahon. Their first taste of fighting was on the roads in North Africa between Tobruk and Derna, However,

by April 1941 they were back in Tobruk and there they stayed for seven long and bitter months. No pick and shovel now – they took the rifle, hand grenade and bayonet and hit back hard at the Germans as they hammered the perimeter. Then the Germans began to hammer from the air - the men in Tobruk had no ack-ack guns and no planes - so had nothing to stop him. The men of Tobruk went underground – they dug themselves trenches and holes and caves.

By night the Kyogle boys and others from their unit had their revenge. The German pilots came so low they could be seen laughing at the "Australian rats" burrowing into the ground, but by night the Germans on the perimeter didn't They listened and listened for the Australian patrols, but it didn't matter how much you listened, you never knew when out of the pitch-black dark came the swinging sandbag which could break a neck without a sound, the bayonet stabbing from nowhere, the noisy life shattering grenade. The Aussie boys got their own back.

Not only by night, either. throughout the battalion are two stories which show that the winning of the Lord Forster Cup was no fluke. Idly one day when they didn't have much to do, Leo Ferris and Albert Brown and others rigged up a mounting for their antitank gun, known amongst all infantrymen as the "elephant gun". Made to be fired from the lying position, it had never been considered as an ack-ack gun. However, this didn't deter Ferris and Brown, and by the end of the day there it was, pointing into the air ready for anything.

They didn't have to wait long. Droning in at the usual 2,000 feet came a flight of nine

Junkers twin-engined bombers. Without much

interest the pioneers watched them pass on and drop their bombs. But a German pilot had seen their position and he peeled off on his way out to do a little strafing for good measure.

Ferris went to the anti-tank cum ack-ack gun and Brown to the Bren gun on its ack-ack stand. The old drill with the Light Horse in Kyogle steadied them against the Nazi. Down came the great Junkers and when about 150 feet from the ground Ferris let him have it with the hard hitting 55 plugs. Brown let go with the Bren, giving him magazine after magazine. Ferris got the port engine, Brown got the starboard and the instrument panel. The Nazi crashed hundreds of yards away. That was one Nazi that didn't get away.

It wasn't the first the Kyogle troop had got that way. A few weeks earlier, they had been posted with Brens on the roofs of Derna to fight off the strafers. This time a Messerschmitt dived from right to left across their zone. The troop reacted as a troop, the fire from the Brens converged on the hurtling Nazi. He flew lamely out to sea, smoke pouring from under his cowling.

A fortnight before Tobruk was relieved, the Pioneers, despite their entreaties to stay and see the siege to a finish, were evacuated. After a brief stay in Palestine they were on the boat again. Like all soldiers they didn't know where they were going, and were happy when they arrived back in Australia. The boys from Kyogle were home for seven days, then off again to New Guinea."

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2001

I am a very proud old Pioneer presenting the 55th Annual Report today. On 13th March 1946 the Inaugural meeting was held to form the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer Bns Association and at a subsequent meeting held on 15th March 1946 at the Hunter Street office of the 2/1-2/2 Comforts Fund with an attendance of eighteen members, the Executive was elected.

From this first meeting of eighteen members our Committee meetings have averaged twenty five members and they have always been productive with original thoughts and ideas being presented. Could anyone present at the initial meeting possibly have had the foresight to envisage that fifty five years later we would still have a very strong Association, carrying our banners into the year 2001.

I was at that first meeting and it is wonderful see so many present after the initial attendance of eighteen members in 1946. The past century has been one of highs and lows and Federation stands out as the top high. Two World Wars were fought and won, but at great sacrifice of young Australian lives. The A.I.F. is just one hundred years old. The deeds of the A.I.F. received world acclaim for the bravery and gallantry from Gallipoli onward. This acclaim was truly deserved. (And so say all of us, came from Committee members).

Our Association has always been blessed with very talented executive officers and none

of us would realise the hours worked by our wonderful Secretary Max Herron who gives up that brilliant commodity on our behalf - ie his time. George Walker, who is our Assistant Secretary is willing and able to help. Don Crawford stepped in when we needed a Treasurer and is most capable in handling our finances and it is great to see Don and Max working so well together. Bill Tasker is a superb Welfare Officer and Roy Levy, as 7th Division delegate has carried out his job even though not well himself. Bill Lewis does our reporting in a most capable manner.

The Pioneer News is next on the agenda and this publication is the means of communicating with Pioneers scattered all over Australia and the many letters received show how important it is. 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On Sunday 12th August, at the Rocky Creek Memorial Service for the 56th Anniversary of VP Day, the unveiling of eight unit plaques took place, which included the combined plaque of the 2/1st and 2/2nd Pioneer Battalions.

The Rocky Creek Memorial Park is situated on the war time site of the 2/2 and 2/6 Aust General Hospitals on the Kennedy Highway, between Mareeba and Atherton, of which the Custodian is the Atherton Shire Council. They have developed the park and provided the granite boulders and the labour to affix the plaques in conjunction with the Rocky Creek War Memorial Park Committee.

To date forty nine plaques have been unveiled so it was quite an honour and privilege for Max Herron 2/1 and Les Tunks 2/1 to unveil the 2/1st and 2/2nd Pioneer plaque. Also present was Jack Hearn 2/2 of Howlong NSW.

The following is a summary of the history of the two units as delivered by Secretary Max Herron at the gathering of 600 spectators.

#### LADIES AND GENTLEMEN

"As Secretary of the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer Battalions Assn. based in Sydney, I am honoured to be here today for the unveiling of the plaque dedicated to both units.

The 2/1st Pioneer Battalion was formed in Sydney in May, 1940, and sailed for the Middle East in September of that year. They served as infantry and engineers in Palestine, Egypt, Libya, the Siege of Tobruk, New their final campaign in Guinea and Balikpapan in Borneo. The surrender of the Japanese forces in the Balikpapan area was taken in their lines on 10th September, 1945.

For their jungle training on the Atherton Tableland the 2/1st Pioneers were staged in camps at Wongabel, Wondecla and then Kairi, attached at various times to both 6th and 7th Divisions.

The 2/2nd Pioneer Battalion was formed in Victoria in May, 1940, and sailed for the Middle East in April, 1941. After several

weeks in Palestine they were on the move to Svria and were involved in heavy fighting until the French sought an armistice in July, 1941. The Battalion then embarked for Java, where several weeks after landing and fighting, they were taken prisoners by the Japanese. The Battalion was then reformed at Wagga in N.S.W. in 1942 and served in New Guinea at Lae, Nadzab and Shaggy Ridge before their final campaigns at Tarakan and Balikpapan.

Whilst on the Tableland, the 2/2nd Pioneers were camped at Ravenshoe, Wongabel and operated as a Beach Group at Trinity Beach.

Both units are now part of history, as are many others, and we thank those members who gave their youth and sadly, in some cases, their lives to make the battalions what they were, units which gave their best at all times either as infantry or engineers. In particular we remember those 400 members from the two units who gave their lives in the service of their country.

We who are left are very proud to have been a member of either unit and our postwar Pioneer Association and before calling on Les Tunks, 2/1 Pioneer of Mareeba to unveil this memorial plaque, I would like to thank the following local people who have been of assistance to me in the preparation of the plaque - Mick Henderson, Les and Lesley Tunks, John Hardy and the Atherton Shire Council. We are also grateful to the Department of Veterans Affairs for sponsorship of our Plaque".

Les Tunks 2/1 then unveiled the plaque by taking away the cloth cover which displayed the two colour patches painted onto calico. This was carried with acclamation by the spectators.Of the eight plaques unveiled it was the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer plaque that was

chosen by the local newspaper The Tablelander" to feature a photo showing the Council workers affixing the plaque to a granite rock, in a feature article the week prior to the

12th August.

The plaque, at left is made of heavy bronze metal and is 600mm x 600mm (2ft x 2ft). The three sections of each triangle are in colours of grey, white and purple and are outlined with a gold border which make it very impressive. The overall cost of the

plaque was \$618 of which \$559 was kindly donated by the Dept. of Veteran Affairs Canberra.

## **CAIRNS-ATHERTON TOUR** By PEG HERRON

When it was first suggested two years ago that an Association plaque be placed in the Rocky Creek Memorial Park, Max and I decided to be there for the unveiling if at all possible – much depending on our health. He had spent such a lot of time and effort in paper work connected with the plaque lay-out and design, that I'm sure he would have been very disappointed if he couldn't make the trip. As I have an ear condition that can be a problem flying, we were rather a daunting three day journey.

We left Sydney on the Brisbane train on the

7th August and even here could not avoid the Census. The forms were distributed and picked up by special staff all along the route. We boarded the "Sunlander" next morning at Brisbane for the long trip to Cairns. Having a comfortable sleeper compartment, the journey though tiring was quite enjoyable with lovely scenery. Arriving at Cairns late next day, we were met by our ex-A.A.M.W.S. friend Vera Bradley and husband, Ron, who drove us to our hotel on the Esplanade. Many thanks to you both.

Saturday morning, a little weary after the long trip, we picked up our hire car and were

soon on our way up the Range to Mareeba. Here we were met by our only Pioneer in the area, Les Tunks 2/1, who took us to his home for a lovely afternoon tea and to meet his wife Lesley. A very enjoyable couple of hours with them and we were off to Atherton to our motel.

Next morning we left for Rocky Creek Park, the "big day" finally with us. We were joined by Les Tunks (unfortunately Lesley was not able to make it). The programme of events commenced at 12.15pm and included military drill, war dog handling, a pipe band and all the old wartime songs. They also had a fly-over of "War Birds" showering the plaque area with hundreds of red poppies. A lovely sight. After lunch, kindly provided by Lesley Tunks, the unveiling ceremony of the eight unit plaques commenced, including the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer plaque by two very proud Pioneers, Max and Les Tunks. Also in attendance were Jack Hearn 2/2 and his wife from Howlong, N.S.W., who happened to be in Cairns on holidays. A wonderful occasion.

On the Monday morning we set out on a day's tour of the old campsites, calling into Atherton War Cemetery on the way. I had collected a bunch of red poppies from the "War Birds" drop on the Sunday and we placed these at the grave of W.O.2 Charlie Gilbert 2/1, who was accidentally killed on 28th December, 1944, at Kairi Camp while preparing a gun cotton explosive demonstration. The War Cemetery is kept in wonderful condition by the War Graves Commission.

From here we proceeded to Herberton and Wondecla where we located the 2/1 campsite marker (complete with colour patch), also the large Igloo hut used during the war for concerts and picture shows - drill too when the weather was bad. This has been fenced and in the process of renovation by a young couple – but I'm sure Max could still hear the ghosts of the past. On from here to Ravenshoe where we found, with difficulty, the 2/2 marker out on the Mt. Garnet Rd.

Tuesday morning drove to Tolga and Kairi and located the campsite markers of the 7th and 9th Divisions, and the 2/1 Pioneers.

We left Atherton on Wednesday and, before

heading back to Cairns, we drove out to Trinity Beach where the 2/2 Pioneers were camped and operated as a Beach Group with the Navy. Their role was to train all units in ship to shore landings, including the 2/1 Pioneers.

Boarded the "Sunlander" next morning for the long journey home. A really great trip.

EDITORS NOTE: The layout below of the Imita Ridge plaque is an abridged version as the original is too large to produce clearly to be read. The original has the same wording as below but in addition contains a photo of Imita Ridge in left corner and a sketch map of Kokoda Track in right hand corner.

### **IMITA RIDGE**

Imita Ridge was reached by the "golden stairs" which consisted of some 2,000 timber steps cut into the mountain side by the engineers. It was an exhausting climb. After leaving Uberi the track rose 1,200 feet in the first three miles, dropped some 1,600 feet and then rose about 2,000 feet in the last four miles.

During 17 September 1942 Brigadier Ken Eather's 25th Brigade at Ioribaiwa withdrew to Imita Ridge and its 3rd, 2/25th, 2/31st, 2/33rd and 2/1st Pioneer Battalions were deployed to meet the final Japanese attack. It was this withdrawal which caused intense consternation at the Allied withdrawal which caused intense consternation at the Allied headquarters in Brisbane. Lieutenant-General Sydney Rowell in Port Moresby told the 7th Division commander, Major General Arthur (Tubby) Allen, that any further withdrawal was out of the question. "Eather must fight it out

The Australians did not know that on 18th September the Japanese had been ordered to withdraw. Nevertheless, when the Australians began patrolling forward from Imita they struck Japanese defences which were still in force on 25 September, On 28 September the Australians at Imita launched a major attack on the Japanese at Ioribaiwa, but found that the Japanese had abandoned the position. At last the Australians could begin their counter-offensive.

The "golden stairs" climbing to Imita Ridge were cut into the track after the 39th Bn first crossed the mountain. Battened at the edge by a rough log, sometimes broken and therefore treacherous, the "stairs" cradled mud and water from the afternoon rains.
