GALLIPOLI - TOBRUK - ALAMEIN TOUR

Association Vice-President, Jack Bertram was in a group of twenty one Rats of Tobruk Association members who did a tour in October 2002 and took part in the commemoration services on the battlefields of Gallipoli, Tobruk and Alamein. The following is Jack's account of this epic journey.

Leaving Sydney on 6th October, we stopped over in Singapore for a day and a half, visiting, amongst other places, Changi Museum and a reconstruction of the chapel in which so many of our 2/2 Pioneers must have worshipped. A place of sad memories.

On departing Singapore we flew to Istanbul and I was fortunate to be joined here by my grandaughter who accompanied us to Tobruk and Alamein. She acquired twenty one instant Grandads.

We spent three days then at the Gallipoli Peninsular which is about 20kms long by 8kms wide. A wonderful but sad place and a credit to the Turkish Government who have made a huge park with its numerous cemeteries, Allied and Turkish. A portion of Sari-Burnu, where the ANZACS landed has a huge cemetery on the beach front and courtesy of the Turks named officially ANZAC. An incredible terrain and I don't know how they lasted from April to December. Most depréssing as about 90% of the graves being of boys in their late teens and early twenties, with many bearing the inscription "Known only to God".

particular monument bearing inscription in both English and Arabic, written by Kemal Ataturk, and which was repeated several times at other memorial sites, read -Those heroes that shed their blood, and lost their lives, you are now lying in the soil of a friendly country - therefore rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies and Mehmets to us, where they be side by side, here in this country of ours. You, the mothers, who sent their sons from far away places, wipe away your tears. Your sons are now lying in our bosom after having lost their lives on this land. They have become our sons as well" – Ataturk 1934.

I did not see a dry eye amongst us when we again saw this epitaph next day at Lone Pine. Here we had a commemoration service and then were able to explore the reconstructed trench system.

Following several days of sight-seeing in this area we boarded a flight at Instanbul to Cairo where we spent a most interesting day sightseeing, visiting the Museum, the Sphinx and the Pyramids.

Leaving Cairo we travelled north west along good road, and after four hours arrived at Mersa-Matruh which caters for a tourist population and consists of many high rise compartments. We stayed here the night in a

very comfortable hotel.

Next day, off to Tobruk, past Sidi Barani. which we only saw in the distance, then Sollum, much bigger now, up the Halfaya Pass, still as steep as it was in 1941, but with an excellent graded road and on to the Egyptian border. This time we did not pass hundreds of Italian soldiers, as in 1941, heading for Sollum. TOBRUK'S BEAUTIFUL HARBOŬR

As we approached Tobruk, heavy showers of rain greeted us and the road into Tobruk cut under a cross over road and we continued along the eastern side of the harbour to our

modern Masira Hotel.

Next day across the beautiful harbour the sun was shining on the large modern city of 100,000 people, several high rise buildings. Oil was discovered South of Tobruk thirty years ago and plus excellent planning responsible for Libya's growth. was

Next day we visited the well maintained Cemetery where

commemoration service, and, the saddest part of the trip, went looking for our mates we had left behind. This was an easy task because of the excellent register at the entrance. Many of Tobruk's dead were also buried at Knightsbridge Cemetery about 12 kms on the Derna Road

After paying our respects to the forty seven mates we left behind, all very youthful, we departed for the French Cemetery then on to the German Memorial, containing the names, but no bodies as they were taken back to their homeland. We then set out for the perimeter, arriving firstly in the Fig Tree area. It was still the deserted place we knew, and the well built posts the Italians had built for us were filled in with rocks and sand. Our slit trenches had long vanished, although there were some rusty pieces of barbed wire around, and some pieces of shrapnel and spent bullets were found. The wadi we used for sleeping is still there, as are the caves we used when stationed in this area. The big surprise was to find the Fig Tree basement full of rain water. The tank traps are still traceable athough they too are filled with stones and sand.

We then followed the western side of the Salient to Hill 209, still the same, except this time we could wander freely over and around it. The old stone buildings to the south east of the Hill are still standing but these were the only things we could positively identify in this area, although we did locate the concrete tops of a couple of the posts. Not having shovels, nor the inclination, we did not excavate any of them.

We then proceeded out to Knightsbridge Cemetery about 15 kms along the Derna Road. where lie men from the battlefields scattered around the desert. Many 6th, 9th Division and Corps Troops are buried here including ten 2/1 Pioneers. I particularly wished to pay my respects to Harry Edwards as I was with him when he was killed and buried him just behind R8 later in the night - a great mate

We then visited areas around Bardia Road sector, and then along the El Adam Road. All told this was a most satisfying visit to places of many memories, but I would have loved to trace our route past Derna, Wadi-El-Cuff, Bardia and Benghazi, but of course this was not the object of the tour

ALAMEIN - EIGHTH ARMY

Next day we headed for Alamein, east of Mersa Matruh, and found Alamein a most memorable spot and rightly commemorated for the wonderful victory there by the Eighth Army. 1942 started badly for the Aussies with Japan entering the war in December 1941, and appearing unstoppable. We were bewildered and were soon heading back home. Unfortunately the 2/2 Pioneers were taken prisoner in Java and as the year wore on, the AXIS after terrific battles at the Knightsbridge Box and Bir Hachiem, seized Tobruk and then surged on to Alamein. Here was waged that great Battle, which the Allies won, with the assistance of the 9th Division, which became a fitting encore to the Japanese first defeat at Milne Bay and Irobaiwa Ridge by the Aussies. The tide had turned in those two episodes and we were to go on in the next few years to the final defeat of Nazism - may it never return.

There are many memorials at Alamein, and graveyards; the Commonwealth Cemetery having 7,368 burials, a number of which unidentified. The memorial bears the names of 12,000 soldiers and airmen who have no known grave, covering all theatres of war around the Mediterranean area. Near the cemetery are the memorials for the 1st South African Division for the battle of Cyrenaica, and the 9th Australian Division memorial

We had a ceremony at the 9th Division memorial, which raised many memories. This was followed by a most impressive ceremony, our Commonwealth represented by the Governor-General Dr Peter Hollingworth, New Zealand by their Prime Minister, Helen Clark M.P. It was most impressive with the trooping of all Commonwealth flags.

A big day and we were glad to get back to our hotel. May all men, whatever their colour or creed, place of birth, strive for that great ideal The brotherhood of man, under the fatherhood

of God" – it can be done.

LONDON – WESTMINSTER ABBEY

Next morning back to Cairo for our trip to gland. Sad for me, because my grandaughter was leaving me for Milan. Arriving London we stayed at the Victory Club and next morning we were entertained at a reception at Australia House by the Australian Commissioner. Then next day, the culmination of the memorial services – a service at Westminster Abbey, which is a beautiful building and when such a show is put on by the Army, it is hard to believe you are participating.

The nave was lined with the standards of the Eighth Army Veterans Association and the Band of the Royal Artillery played incidental music. The choir of Westminster gave several items. The whole service was well planned and a great pleasure to be in attendance. The official party was led by the Duke of Edinburgh, consisting of several of the Royalty, Lord Mayors, Generals and Admirals, and we were all seated in a prominent position. A wonderful service being particularly noteworthy in that Viscount Montgomery (Monty's son) read the first lesson and the second lesson was read by Manfred Rommel (Rommel's son).

After the service we adjoined to a large conference room for eats and drinks, each table having a prominent member of the Eighth Army to look after us. A great show and even more so with the many Army uniforms. I was intrigued with the spurs worn by the Tank Corps and I tapped a person on the shoulder and enquired, did they use the spurs to drive the tanks. He looked surprised and said "I am not sure, it must come with the uniform, I was navy would be strange though" My table companion laughed and said to me "That was Prince Phillip" - no wonder he was at a loss. I thought he looked familiar. This was our last official function of the tour, but we had a great night at the Victory Club, as some were leaving us and the rest of us were proceeding to Scotland. We were joined at the Victory Club by members of the German Afrika Corps, so it was a night of

PERTH, SCOTLAND

We then proceeded to Perth, where the 51st Highland Regiment invited us to a dedication of a memorial to them in a park in several day's time. On arrival we were well received and had a great time.

After a very nice service we, with the veterans of the 51st Regiment marched through Perth, with twelve pipe bands, and lots of army units to a park where the memorial to the 51st Highland Division was dedicated. Like us, the march of time has caught up with them. as they are in the process of disbandment. This did not spoil a great night in a huge marquee, where over 400 of us sat down to an excellent three course dinner and entertainment.

This concluded my official tour but I spent several weeks with my son-in-law and my grandaughter which was akin to the icing on the cake.

CHRISTMAS AS A CHILD
Our good friend in Cairns, Vera Bradley,
AAMWS, was asked by the Cairns Post to write what she remembered about Christmas as a child and Vera used her article as her Christmas letter to us. We thought we would share it with you - and bring back memories.

Christmas is coming the geese are getting fat, please put a penny in the old mans hat, if you haven't got a penny, a halfpenny will do, if you haven't got a halfpenny, well God Bless You, is what we used to sing after school broke up for the seven weeks school's Christmas holidays. Not only was it a joy, no more school but also, Christmas was coming and the long awaited presents and all that went with it, plus

the lovely Christmas dinner.

My first memory of Christmas goes back to 1929 when I recall being scared of Santa after he lifted me up at Boland's Christmas street stall. A canvas-covered treasure trove that went from the footpath out onto Spence Street road and displayed the most wonderful toys, at another stall jutting out from the shop onto the footpath was beautifully gift-wrapped presents

for sale also.

Christmas Eve and the night before Good
Friday were the only nights of the year the
shops stayed open until 9pm. It was magical to go into town and see the lighted shop windows plus all the wonderful things our parents could not afford. We accepted this; it was being in the crowded streets where everyone was so happy that gave us the excited feeling of Christmas. Many happy evenings ended with a thunderstorm and then walking home in the heavy rain, but that did not matter, it was Christmas.

On opening our eyes in the morning we could see a red Xmas stocking full of nuts, sweets, whistles, comic pages and games poking out of our pillowcase. Presents were mostly a celluloid doll or tea set for the girls and the boys aeroplanes, trains or cars massed produced in Japan by stamping out sheets of tin, leaving a small strip folded into a small slot to hold the toy together. A lot of tears were shed on Christmas Day when one of the flaps broke off or the key wound spring mechanism broke, making the toy useless.

The best was yet to come. CHRISTMAS DINNER, in the downstairs dining room where crepe paper streamers, fine paper Christmas

balls, bells and lanterns had been hung.

The smell of the cooked ham that Pop had won at the Ambulance Christmas Carnival, plus the plum duff (pudding) cooking on the wood fired stove made us hungry, but the best of all was the tantalising smell of the roosters being roasted. For weeks we had fattened them especially for this occasion. Pop had cut off their heads and we kids watched the poor thing's last fight for life. It was our job to keep the water boiling in Mum's washing boiler to scald the chooks, we then had to pluck and gut them. We smelt of wet chook feathers for the rest of the day.

The older girls helped Mum peel the vegetables, make red and green jelly to set in the ice chest. We ate the jelly with the plum pudding, tinned peaches and custard. As there was no room in the ice chest for the soft drink and watermelon, to keep them cool they were stored in water overnight in Mum's concrete washtubs and covered with wet heavy hessian potato sacks that were kept moist during the day.

At last 12.30 came, Mum and Pop, we six kids and our guests sat down to the long awaited feast. Even though we were as full as ticks, as we used to say, we still nibbled on plums, cherries, figs, lollies and nuts set in little bowls on the table. Of course, we also had to finish off the plum pudding just in case there was still the chance of finding more of the threepences and sixpences that Mum would have tossed into the mixture before cooking. After the dishes were washed and our parents rested, it was the custom for those who could to play rounders. Then it was watermelon time.

As Christmas Day drew to a close, we knew that in a week's time we would do it all again to celebrate the beginning of a new year.

THE PIONEER BANNERS

BY JOHN TREVETHICK, Secretary 1946

In the early post-war years, the units did not have banners, as on ANZAC Day they carried a cardboard sign on a pole with the units' title supplied by the RSL

In the late 1940's, however, approval was granted for banners to be designed and paid for by the individual units.

At the Committee meeting held on 26th January, 1950, presided over by ex C.O. Geoff Graham the following motion was approved:

"Arrangements be made for the manufacture of two banners for the use of 2/1st and 2/2nd Pioneers. Each unit to have campaign honours as applicable to the unit. attached to the banner.

Each banner at a cost of approximately £14.

Moved by D. Walker and seconded by
E. Face, that this matter be left in the hands of John Trevethick

After several trips to the Public Library in Macquarie Street, it was decided the shape of the banners to be the Heraldic Shield type. most favoured by British units, both for its historical significance and it could be carried by one person.

The banners to be purple, the official army colour for engineers, to signify that element in our dual role as Infantry and Engineers. An enlargement of the unit badge plus unit number and title, with campaign honours were superimposed in white on the shield. In the early years they were termed campaign honours, as the term "Battle Honours" was not formulated until about 1960.

Over the years the original banners became worn and damaged which necessitated removing all the lettering, renewing the purple cloth and then sewing back the white lettering. This was carried out in 1962 by Laura Westwood, wife of Joe who was the then Social Secretary, and Peg Herron, wife of Secretary.

The original banners were made by the late Connie Lester of Double Bay, at no charge. She was a friend of John and Cyril Morahan who were both on the Committee of the Association.

The 2/2 Pioneers in Victoria, in early years, had formed their own 2/2 Pioneer Bn Ássoc. under Clayton Davis and had their own separate banner, whereas in NSW the two units came together to form the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer Bn in 1946. which made for easier administration and lower costs. Both branches. over the years have had their own newsletters. but have kept in touch with one another through the two Secretaries

Because of high numbers, in NSW the two units had separate venues for the Anzac Day Reunions until 1976 when they came together and held a combined Reunion at the Redfern Town Hall of 170 members.

Then in 1994 they moved to the Occidental Hotel in York Street, with an attendance of 104 but now down to fifty two members combined plus twenty two relations. At these combined Reunions both banners have been proudly and prominently displayed alongside one another.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Many thanks for your most interesting article John ~ we feel sure it will bring back memories to our members who, like ine, would not know the work and research that went into producing the two famous banners.

minister called nogu granddaughter to speak on Bill's family life and then called on President Allan McInnes to deliver the Eulogy on Bill's military service which he carried out as follows:

Bill enlisted in May, 1940 and was posted to the 2/1 Pioneer Battalion and after training at Greta and Dubbo camps sailed with the unit to the Middle East and served in the seven month

Siege of Tobruk.

On return to Australia in 1942 he was seconded to the newly formed 2/2 Pioneer Battalion, whose original members had been captured in the fall of Java. During the 1943 New Guinea campaign as a Captain he was O.C. of "D" Coy and took part in the Lae campaign including Nadzab, Tsili Tsili and

Shaggy Ridge.
In 1945 he was appointed Major-Beach
Commander for the 2/2 Pioneer Battalion when they landed at Tarakan and in the final

campaign at Balikpapan, Borneo. Since the war. Bill has been a staunch Committee member since 1948 and served in an Executive position as Vice-President for many years and in recent times as Co-Patron. In 1943 Bill was made a Life Member for his outstanding service to the Association. He has not missed an Anzac Day March and Reunion Dinner and has attended many Country Reunions conducted by the Association.

In April, 1998. Bill was awarded the Order of Australia Medal after being nominated by the Clovelly RSL Sub-Branch (which he joined in 1951) because of his dedication to the Branch where he served in numerous roles as President. Pensions and Welfare Officer and delegate to the NSW State Congress

Bill was a keen member of the Rats of Tobruk Association and each year attended the Tobruk Sunday Service at the Five Dock

Bowling Club.

President Allan concluded the Eulogy by saying we thank God for the life of our friend and our sincere sympathy is extended to his wife Toss and her family. He will be sadly missed by all.

V.P. COMMEMORATION SERVICE

The Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway at Concord NSW was again the venue on 15th August for holding the memorial service to commemorate Victory in the Pacific and the conclusion of World War II. The Walkway is now looked upon as a memorial to all exservicemen, so it was pleasing to see representatives from both 2/1st and 2/2nd Pioneer Battalions in attendance.

Her Excellency, Professor Marie Bashir A.C., Governor of N.S.W., was the guest speaker and the Master of Ceremonies, John Gatfield, handled the programme of events with precision. Present was an excellent attendance of veterans, wearing their medals, accompanied by families and friends who were all comfortably seated in the marquee shelters.

This year the 60th anniversary of the "Battle of the Beaches" was especially honoured. The north Papuan coast was to see some of the fiercest fighting, which resulted in the eventual defeat of the Japanese in the Papuan campaign and their expulsion from the areas centred on Buna, Gona and Sanananda

The welcome address was delivered by Rusty Priest A.M. Chairman of the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway Committee. In his usual exuberant way, he particularly mentioned the wonderful young Australians who, under the outstanding leaderships of Lt.-Col. Honor 39th Infantry Battalion, were the first troops to come in contact with the Japanese forces.

ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR

Her Excellency gave the official address and mentioned the amazing contribution by such a large enlistment of Australians to the war and the sad loss of lives in many conflicts. She gave special thought to the valiant young Australians forcing the Japanese to retreat to the beaches, which marked the end of Japanese intentions to seek with his Kokoda campaign, a direct action to Australia. She quoted General Sir William Slim, Governor General of Australia in the mid 1950's when he said "The forces from Australia were the first to stop the Japanese attackers". She hoped these stories are brought to the attention of our young people.

In concluding her address, Her Excellency said it was a great privilege to participate at this beautiful Walkway, which is an amazing contribution in remembrance to our outstanding young forces and particularly in memory of those who were lost.

GUARD OF HONOUR

Members of the 233rd Regional Cadet Unit, St George, supplied the Guard of Honour to welcome the official party and provide the Catafalque Party. The occasion was ably supported by the NSW Corrective Services Band and Pipes and Drums Royal NSW Regiment who not only supplied music for the two hymns and the National Anthem but rendered a most enjoyable programme of ceremonial music, including a well received rendition of "Highland Cathedral". clergymen were in attendance and recited special prayers selected for the occasion. A new innovation this year occurred when the scripture reading was delivered by Eleana Talamara, a scholar from Concord High School, which was a great idea to call on the young folk to participate

A Kokoda veteran. Lloyd Birdsall of 14th Aust Field Regiment was called on to recite the Ode of Remembrance. I met him later and when I told him my unit being 2/1 Pioneers he said "It was your mob that man-handled our 25 pounder guns up the track". Refer page 102 of our book "The Pioneers". especially the letter from the C.O. of the artillery regiment to our Colonel Arnold Brown.

Director of Kokoda Track Committee, lan McManus concluded proceedings with a word of thanks to all personnel and groups for their participation in making this service such a great success. He especially mentioned Alice Kang, who has been Hon. Secretary of the Walkway. right from the start of this venture, which was conceived by Alan Kincade who at that time was General Manager of Concord Repatriation Hospital. That was in 1995 and he asked one of his nursing sisters Alice Kang to take on the secretary's job, which she has carried out ever since.

Everyone was then invited to the excellent afternoon tea which had been prepared and presented by staff from Concord Hospital. MAD HARRY

I would like to share with you extracts from "Mad Harry" (he wasn't mad, but ultra brave) which is the biography of Australian Henry William "Harry" Murray, the British Empire's most decorated infantryman of World War I and I recommend the book to you all. The title "Mad Harry" is by George Franki and Clyde Slatyer. Harry's decorations included the V.C., C.M.G., D.S.O. and Bar, D.C.M., C de G (Croix de Guerre)

In the book Harry Murray was an original ANZAC and after being evacuated wounded he returned and from there went to France, where he had a very meritorious record. He never did a school or attended lectures or classes, but rose from the ranks to Lt-Colonel and was recognised as a top leader, as shown by his decorations

During World War II he was given command of the 26 Bn. A.M.F. in Central Queensland. He argued strongly to join the A.I.F. but General Blamey would not allow it, even though there were many soldiers of his rank over 55 years. and had him put on the supernumerary list relieving him of his command. It wasn't who you

knew, but possibly a jealous General.

Also from "Mad Harry" there is an article which reminds me of an incident at Cairns when a very depleted 2/2nd Pioneer Bn. got some hundreds of recruits to build up strength after New Guinea. When we went home on leave and the time came to return to camp, the Victorians were unable to catch trains because of a large backlog of troops and had to take extra leave (bad luck). Recruits not very well trained and some only fresh into camp were put on guard. Our new C.O., Lt.-Col. Clayton Davis, a fitness fanatic, on his morning run at 5.30 a.m. (as was his custom dressed in shorts, singlet and sandshoes) passed the sentry who was leaning on his rifle almost asleep. Not realising that the runner was the new C.O. and in reply to the Colonel's "Good morning sentry" (in his best "pucka" voice) the sentry answered

"some of you bastards get it easy."

From "Mad Harry", a nursing sister stationed in Charters Towers area hitched a ride to town on a garbage truck. A little further along the road a soldier hailed the truck and was also picked up. The talk was very amiable and on leaving the elderly private (she thought) snapped a classy salute and their ways parted. The sister was told some days later that the new admission was Australia's most decorated soldier and on doing rounds she recognised the patient who had shared a lift was Lt.-Col. Murray. She wondered why he didn't use a staff car - á little classier than á garbage truck.

A poem in the book was a reminder of an old song the 2/1st Pioneers used to sing during the war years and at our 2/1-2/2 reunions, especially by our good Pioneer friend Mary Lloyd. It went as follows:

The Pioneers are happy, The Pioneers are free, The Pioneers are happy When they are on the spree. They never never quarrel They never disagree But they all dropped dead When Érownie said Come and have a drink with me."

("Brownie" as most 2/1sts would remember was Colonel Arnold Brown, the C.O. of the Battalion from 1941-1943)

VALE GEORGE WALKER

On 8th July George Walker 2/1 late of Kilbride Village. Rosemeadow. formerly Culburra. passed away in Campbelltown hospital, aged 82 years George had been

and in Campbelltown and Liverpool Hospitals with heart and lung problems since Anzac Day, and even after a pace maker had been fitted he had not enjoyed good health.

The funeral service for George was held on 11th July at the Forest Lawn Crematorium. Leppington and the Chapel was packed with people from all walks of life who had been associated with George over many years.

Pioneers in attendance at the funeral were: Frank and Jean Locane. Tom and René Woods. Olive. Lyn and Geoff Finlay. Jack and Marj Kerslake. Bill Tasker. Don and Val Crawford. Max. Peg and David Herron.

The Minister called upon George's daughter Susan, to speak on his family life and then called on Welfare Officer Bill Tasker to deliver the RSL Poppy Service. also to give the Eulogy on George's military service which he carried out as follows:- "George enlisted in the 2nd A.I.F. in 1942 and was posted to the 2/4th Field Company Engineers. He served with that unit at Milne Bay in New Guinea, where the company carried out a massive road building project through the jungle. He later transferred to the 2/1st Pioneer Battalion, and was posted to "D"

Coy.
In September 1943, "D" Coy was moved to Port Moresby to rejoin the remainder of the unit before returning to Australia in November of that year. They then carried out extensive Jungle training on the Atherton Tablelands as well as ship to shore training at Trinity Beach near Cairns.

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In April 1945 the unit sailed for Balikpapan in Borneo where they again fought the Japanese until cessation of hostilities on 15th August 1945. After the war George served in the Regular Army and was discharged in 1969 after

12 years of service.
George joined the Association Committee in 1972 and in 1975 was appointed Assistant Secretary and served in this position until his passing. In 1986 he was awarded Life Membership of the 2/1 2/2 Pioneer Bns Association in recognition of his outstanding service to the Association. As Assistant Secretary he was on the Social Committee and served on that Committee, assisting in the organisation of the twenty Country Reunions, the Anzac Day marches and Reunion Dinner as

well as being Custodian of the 2/1st Banner. In addition to all this, George assisted the Secretary at every Committee Meeting and as a member, with Joyce, as a member of the Pioneer News wrapping committee for 30 years.

We thank God for the life of our friend George and we extend our sincere sympathy to his wife Joyce and her family. He will be sadly missed by his fellow Pioneers"

After the service Bill Tasker personally extended the Association's sympathy to Joyce and her family of Brian. David, Susan and Judith.

AUSTRALIANS AT WAR

The Federal Government had two episodes made and presented on TV by Channel Two. The Honourable Danna Vale MP has followed on by handling a massive project named "Australians at War Film Archive" which will have two thousand veterans interviewed and photographed for storage in the archives.

The process is that Mullion Creek Productions P/L has been appointed to interview the veterans and the first approach is a telephone two hour interview by the agency, then the next phase is a two by four hour interview and photographs which is carried out in the veteran's home

This valuable documentation will be stored for posterity and in years to come, schoolchildren, teachers, academics, film makers and historians will be able to carry out research from these interviews. The internet site for the Archive will be launched in August 2003 and as transcriptions are completed each interview will be posted on the site.

At present only four hundred veterans have had the full two interviews and an all out effort is being made to complete the project. These interviews will not be edited or cut but will be posted in the archives, warts and all. Our two battalion stories will be given by John Gilchrist and Max Herron who both have had the phone interview as representing the 2/1sts. Jack Allison 2/2nd and Allan representing both the 2/2nd and the Extreme Disabled Association, have both completed their full phone and two four hour interviews at home

Having completed their endurance test of the eight hour interviews. Jack and Allan have received a letter from the Project Director thanking them for the generous gift of their time and memories, for without them this valuable national resource could not exist.

2/1 - 2/2 PIONEER COYS.

Many of our members have enquired about the banner they see on the ANZAC Day march which is displayed as 2/1-2/2 SPECIAL PIONEER COMPANIES, so upon request Bob Gray, Secretary of their Association has kindly supplied the following details - Editor

In December 1941 an avalanche of enlistments followed Japan's entry into the war and drafts were assigned from Sydney to the 9th Pioneer Training Battalion at Dubbo. Then followed six weeks of Infantry and Pioneer training and then pre-embarkation leave.
During 3rd to 11th February 1942 saw two companies formed and designated, 2/1 and 2/2 Pioneer Training Rifle Companies.

Colour patches allocated were triangular purple inside white and inside a grey background 2/2 was triangular white inside purple and a grey background. The officers in command were 2/1 Captain Stuart MC and 2/2

Captain Burnett.

The contingent was transported by rail to Narellan training camp for further infantry training instruction and it was then split into two separate detachments - the 2/1 to Ingleburn and the 2/2 to Rosehill Race course. Then on 1st April they were brought together for an eleven day trip to Katherine NT, arriving on 11 April 1942.

Duties here were road improvements, Railway siding construction, building meat chilling stores, enlarging Aust. General Hospital at Katherine, and timber getting for buildings. These duties were additional to the continuance of infantry training which was carried out on some evenings and on weekends.

The companies were briefed that Darwin Command anticipated an invasion from the north by the Japanese using small craft on the Adelaide and Katherine Rivers, and it was the Pioneers role to counter such incursions. Contingents were sent to Pine Creek, Adelaide River and Mataranka to construct railway sidings on the Larrimah to Darwin rail line.

In September 1942 the companies were amalgamated to be termed, 2/11 Army Troops Company RAE and adopting a purple triangle colour patch on a grey background. Major Hugh Bond O/C and Captain Bill Fraser 2ic were sent from 2/4 Pioneer Battalion with other officers.

Some of our officers were sent to Kapooka participate in reforming the 2/2 Pioneer Battalion and these were. Capt. Allan McInnes, Capt Harry Huggard, Lieuts. Welch and Harris. White. West,

In 1942 a driver died in an accident in a truck at the Katherine River crossing. Only other problems encountered were, tropical ulcers; dysentery; dengue; dermatitis and malaria.

In July 1943 the company was despatched to Kapooka Engineer training depot and as they were not expected they stayed in the Red Cross hut. After concluding the course, reinforcements were taken in and the unit then went to Wongabel in the Atherton Tableland, and then down to Trinity Beach where a detachment constructed a beach landing feature. (Which no doubt was used by both the 2/1 and 2/2 Pioneer Bns for their amphibious training for Borneo).

In March 1944 the 2/11th embarked on the 'Sea Barb" for Moratai, and its operations there were, Island water supply, road construction and installations, until cessation of hostilities in August 1945, when it was represented at the surrender.

After restructure in 1942 large numbers transferred to more forward units and those successful went to RAAF aircrew, 2/3 Inf Bn.

and to the following engineer field companies – 2/1. 2/3. 2/4. 2/5. 2/8. 2/15 and 2/25. These people served in Liberators, and beach landings at Wewak. Aitape, Labuan, Tarakan and Balikpapan.
