ANZAC ACTIVITIES 2014

WREATH LAYING SERVICE

Thursday, 24th April at 3.45pm

All members and their families are invited to the Wreath Laying Service at the Cenotaph on Thursday, 24th April at 3.45pm. The Association consider this event to be the most important event of the year and are hoping for a good attendance.

Members and relatives to assemble on the G.P.O. side near the corner of Pitt Street and Martin Place at around 3.15pm ready to form up at 3.40pm for the short walk to the Cenotaph. Medals are requested to be worn. The Marshal will be John Hayden, son of the late Captain John Hayden 2/1, and a bugler has been arranged by Kay Burton, daughter of our late 2/1 member Bert Rayner.

Personal family wreaths may be laid following the official part of the ceremony.

ANZAC DAY MARCH

Friday, 25th April

There will be significant changes to the March compared to our experiences in past years. The 2/1 and 2/2 Pioneer Battalions will not be marching under their own unit banners, instead these veterans marching will do so as one group covering 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th Divisions, who served in the 2nd World War. A single carer may accompany a veteran marcher. Veterans unable to march may find seating in a Land Rover that will precede the general march. Bookings are necessary.

VETERANS to form up in Hunter Street, facing Pitt Street, and likely commencement will be 9.15am. Required assembly approximately 8.45am.

DESCENDANTS OF VETERANS to form up in Castlereagh Street facing south towards King Street, but may not be expected to move off for possibly an hour to an hour and a half after the veterans.

They need to assemble for marshalling by 9.30am. Descendants to march under their own 2/1 and 2/2 Pioneer banners which will be carried by Tim Lloyd for the 2/1st and Gordon Collins for the 2/2nd. There will be no band to precede the Pioneer Battalions as has been the case for the past 20 years or so. They will be sadly missed.

ANZAC DAY REUNION

The Occidental Hotel is once again the venue for the ANZAC reunion, which is situated on the corner of York and Erskine Streets, Sydney, opposite Wynyard Park.

In the hotel foyer you will be greeted by sons Geoff Finlay, David Herron and Ray Law who will collect the lunch fee of \$25 and issue name tags.

The Ladies Auxiliary will proceed upstairs and have their lunch fee of \$30 collected by Lynn Herron who will supply their name tags.

Members to be seated by 12.00pm and lunch will be served at 12.30pm will consist of sliced roast sirloin with vegetables and buttered roll. Ladies will have same menu as above, with dessert.

The reunion Chairman will be Mark Neasbey, son of Bert 2/2.

VP DAY – KOKODA TRACK WALKWAY

A service was held at the Kokoda Track Memorial Walkway on Thursday, 15th August, 2013 to commemorate the 68th Anniversary of Victory in the Pacific, and 70th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bismark Sea, in the presence of General Peter Cosgrove A.C. M.C (retired), also Chair, N.S.W. Centenary of ANZAC Advisory Council.

The service was conducted by Father Graeme Malone SSS, Hon. Chaplain of Concord Hospital and Rev. Paul Weaver, Anglican Chaplain of Concord Hospital. Mr. John Gatfield was Master of Ceremonies.

After the arrival of the Official Party and the Mounting of the Catalfalque Party by the 38th Support Group, the Prologue was given by Angelo Tsirekas, Mayor of Canada Bay.

Following the welcome to guests by Mr. John Haines AM, who is Chairman of the Kokoda Track Walkway, and a Bible Reading by Jennifer Collins, Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Veteran Affairs, he then called on General Cosgrove to give the V.P. Day Address.

V.P. Day ended six years of hardship and sacrifice and signalled the start of a new era of peace. The war had taken an enormous toll on the physical and emotional health of our veterans and many never fully recovered.

Our thanks go to those thousands of our veterans who displayed such courage in the horrors of war, those who fought so bravely, who served faithfully. We acknowledge the debt we owe them.

To those who served along the Kokoda Track, Milne Bay and in the air or in the Battle of the Bismark Sea, we are ever grateful. Seventy years have passed since those events and we remember so the lessons of the past may not be forgotten.

Following General Cosgrove's address, the Reflection was excellent footage from the Australian War Museum of the Bismark Sea Battle and brought back lots of memories of wartime news at theatres around the country.

This was followed by the Wreath Laying Ceremony conducted by John Gatfield and, with the screen, the attending public were able to view the Kokoda Track Walkway Centrepiece and the laying of the wreaths, with the Harp Accompaniment by Elizabeth Lowrencev.

The Ode to the Fallen was given by Mr Don Rowe OAM, follwed by Last Post and Reveille.

Our sincere thanks to Alice Kang, Hon. Secretary and the Walkway Committee for the organisation of the service and the afternoon tea that followed.

Pioneers who attended were our Treasurer Don Crawford and his wife Val, Robyn Bell, Marj Kerslake and her daughter Margaret Stolp and Peg Herron.

REMEMBRANCE DAY, 2013

A special Remembrance Day Service was held at the 113th A.G.H. Memorial Chapel at Concord on Monday, 11th November, 2013, and the Association was represented by our Treasurer Don Crawford and his wife Val, Association Secretary Peg Herron and her son David Herron and his wife Lynn.

It was a wet, cold day and not quite the crowd who usually attend.

Members of the congregation were then invited to place a poppy on the Cross on the Altar in memory of a loved one and comrades who had died in time of war or had been serving members of our armed forces.

Following the prayers to commemorate the Fallen, the Meriden Senior Singers gave a fine rendition of "Irish Blessing" by Bob Chilcott, followed by the Benediction and our National Anthem.

Refreshments were served at the conclusion of the service in the Conference Rooms where our "Pioneer Family" were pleased to pass on our special thanks to Alice Kang and her Veterans Services staff.
