FAREWELL LT. COL. JEFFREY GRAHAM

Something we did not know about our Late C.O., Lieut. Colonel George John Graham, M.M. and Bar, affectionately known as "Jeffrey John," can now be revealed.

Those who knew Jeffrey well, assessed him as a very astute soldier, one who knew how to delegate authority and one who always commanded respect.

Born 14th July, 1897, London, educated at Highfield College, Surrey, England, Jeffrey enlisted in the British Army, 10th Royal Fusiliers, on 17th August, 1914 and served three years in France and Belgium and during this service he was awarded the Military Medal to which he added a Bar, which in turn led to his promotion to commissioned rank.

At the end of 1918, he transferred to the Indian Army, 2/41 Dogras, serving on the North West Frontier and the Afghan War of 1919.

In 1924 he returned to England and was placed on the Reserve of Officers.

Eventually he migrated to Australia and it was October 1939 when he enlisted in the A.M.F. and joined 2 Garrison Bn. as a Company Commander. Subsequently he was transferred to the now famous 2/1 Aust. Pioneer Bn., where in June, 1942 he was appointed 2 I/C as a Major and in August 1943 to C.O. as Lieut Col.

In August 1944 Jeffrey transferred to G.D.D., Queensland, as C.O. and in November 1944 moved to L.T.D., Western Australia as C.O. and remained until July 1946, when he was demobilised and placed on the Reserve of Officers.

He then joined the Repatriation Dept. and was a member of the Tribunal and to his great credit, his vote was always in favour of the Digger, when any doubt



TOM CARR, 2/1st. On Thursday, 27th February, 1975, at the Presbyterian Church, St. George, Kingsford, I attended the funeral of the Late TOM CARR.

To the church Tom was a regular follower and well liked, as could be seen by a full attendance at the church.

Tom Carr left behind many people who remembered, how through the years, he had endeavoured to assist his fellow man who were unable to assist themselves. Prior to his passing on, he had travelled as far as Brisbane to help someone less fortunate than himself. Even to the last day he had assisted in the washing and nursing of one of his relations.

HERB WILSON & TWO BROTHERS

The following is an extract from the Womens Weekly of Sept/Oct. 1941 and happened at Kilo 89, Palestine.

Jack Wilson, one of three brothers serving with the A.I.F., to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Wilson, of Gloucester, N.S.W.

"After hearing (and we hear many rumors here) that Herb's unit had been moved back in Palestine for a rest about 15 miles from me, I set out hitch-hiking to investigate. When I reached the 2/1 Pioneers' orderly room and asked for Herb Wilson, I was asked in return, 'Are you another brother?'

"Can you imagine my surprise? When I was told that both he and Stan were within 200 yards of me I left so hurriedly I nearly took the orderly room post with me, and the boys must have thought there was an air raid on. When I found Herb, he and Stan were sitting on his bed with their backs to me. Ted Simpson was also with them and saw me first. I signalled to him not to speak and I sneaked right up and put my hands over Herb's eyes, but I was so excited myself, I cannot remember if he guessed correctly or not.

"Stan had found him only about 20 minutes before me - under a shower. Stan is camped closer to him than I. Weil, did we have a great day! It is one day of this war I shall never forget. Herb looks real well and is still the same old chap. He was very modest about what he had gone through in Libya, but after hearing of their experiences from Ted and other mates he did his share and a little more, and Stan and I are mighty proud of him."

Education Week can surely provide no better instance of communication than the thread of fellowship connecting a village in Papua New Guinea with a home in Bruce Street, Ryde.

Mr. Norman Rose, president of 7 Aust. Div. Association (88-1016) lives at Ryde.

At the other end of the thread is a school at Situmgobari, 12 miles from Lae. Veterans of 7 Div. in grateful remembrance of Fuzzy-Wuzzy loyalty and help in action against the Japanese more than 30 years ago, brought the school into

The start of the fund which brought the school into existence is a story on its own.

The needy widow of one of the veterans was preparing to auction her late husband's Victoria Cross.

To prevent this, 7 Div members chipped in so handsomely that, after the VC was bought for presentation to Canberra, there was \$800 left.

This was enough to begin the construction of a double classroom for the young Fuzzy-Wuzzy generation.

From these humble beginnings, the roll call at the school now numbers 316 and the school is headed for high school

Bells for the school, supplied by the Churches of England at Gymea and at Gymea and Putney now call the pupils of Situm-Gobari to their classes. The school has passed into the control of the authorities with the appreciation of the NG Chief Minister, Mr. Somare, but 7 Div. still plays the role of a P. & C. Association for the school.

Singers have co-operated in a roundup of which has resulted in a number of non-electric sewing machines being given to the school.

Timber was sent by the 7 Div. Association to the Catholic School at Lae where it was made into desks in a students' project and delivered to the Situm-Gobari school. The school was officially

opened in August, 1973.
Seeds provided by the Association for planting in the grounds will be taken to the school by a group of 22 ex-members of the Australian Women's Army Service who served during 1945-46 This group has now returned to Australia.

REPORT ON PENSIONS

By coutresy Gerry Collins, 2/1 Pensions Officer, Penshurst RSL Advance

Entitlement appeals tribunals are a very important feature with veterans attempting to have disabilities accepted as being due or to aggravated by War Service. It is very important to use some common sense and realise that War Service is separated from, now by a wide margin of years, with the possible ex-ception of some Vietnam Veterans. Be-fore your case gets to a tribunal, your claim is first refused by the Repatriation Board and your appeal disallowed by the Commission. One does not have to be bright to accept the fact that if the appeal to a tribunal is to succeed, additional evidence may be necessary.

How do we obtain this additional evi-In many cases we can't, but dence? there are cases where we can. Before the Board decides a claim, a departmental medical officer has to prepare a section 48 opinion. In this, he or she is obliged to outline the possible causes of the claimed disability, then the first question that has to be answered is, "Has the incapacity resulted from an occurrence that happened during his war service?" Secondly, "Did the incapacity arise out Secondly, of, or is it attributable to his war service?" Thirdly, "Is any disability diagnosed causally related to any accepted or rejected disability, if so comment on relationship" and lastly, "Has the incapacity been contributed to in any material degree, or has it been aggravated by the conditions of his war service?"

The doctor who answers these questions is guided by incidents recorded in the veteran's service documents, together with statements made by the applicant and clinical notes obtained from home medical officers and hospitals that have been nominated by the applicant.

Should the answers be negative then the entitlement to treatment and/or pension for the disabilities would be refused.

Fresh evidence in these cases may be obtained by referring your summary of evidence to a doctor of your own choice to see whether or not he can rebut the unfavourable medical opinion. Your advocate will recommend this type of action or advise against it should he feel that you have little or no chance of success.

Another method of obtaining supporting evidence may be by producing statut-ory declarations. This applies when an injury or illness suffered on service is not recorded. If you can produce evidence from a former serving member of the incident it must strengthen your claim. Quality of the new evidence is much more important than quality.

Let's take an example: If the departmental medical opinion were to say: "If the alleged injury did occur it could be the cause of the present disability." Then a statutory declaration verifying the occurrence would weigh strongly in your favour. However, if the same medical opinion read, "If the alleged injury did occur, it must have been minor and is insignificant, because the present incapacity is slight and compatable with his age and occupation" all the statutory declarations here would be of no avail.

Where your credence is at stake it is important that you attend the hearing and subject yourself to a series of questions, the answers given would convince the tribunal of your honesty or lack of it.

Let's understand that tribunals today must give written reasons for their de-
