Once upon a time there was a Treasurer who. when reporting on finances, spoke in glowing terms on how well off his concern was just a fairy tale, of course. Treasurers are the biggest alarmists and knockers in the business from the National level downwards.

Our Pioneer News cost for the 1977-78. . . (here he goes) . . . was \$1366.57 (subject to audit) which is a 75.9% increase in cost for the previous twelve months. Admittedly we are now producing four copies a year, as against the three per year previously, which means an additional cost of approximately \$330.00.

As I have reported in previous times the cost for postage of "News" doubled during 1977-1978 to offset this additional expense, the receipts for monies received are inserted in the following copy of the paper, but this by no means covers our extra cost, but, at least it is a

The time taken in inserting these receipts fall on the wrapping people. There is talk through newspaper level of a further rise in postage

So. . . If the present rate of contributions continue we will be just a shade "in the red", that is of course, firstly, with no allowance made for a decrease in the number of our members. secondly, more members becoming eligible for pension rates and thirdly, possible increase in printing and postage rates.

Numerous members have sent in their subscriptions after receiving a copy of Pioneer News and many will be making their Annual Subscription on Anzac Day and we do say thank you to these members - this appeal is therefore directed to those who have neglected to send along their subscription - in other words "How about hitting the can".

HAPPY EASTER

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE 2/1 PIONEER BN.

(To be presented in parts by A. Montague)

GRETA was the birthplace of the 2/1 Pioneer Bn and upon enquiries it has been found the name originated from the early settlers in that area.

They had arrived from hamlets around the small river called Greta in Yorkshire in England.

The Unit was formed at Greta on Tuesday 11th June, 1940 and Frank Sellick was the first R.S.M. while Jack Reynolds was the first R.Q.M.S.

PRE EMBARKATION LEAVE ended on Friday 27th September, 1940 and No.11 Platform at Sydney Central Station was densely packed with friends and relatives to farewell our members going to Dubbo.

Two trains were used, one to depart at 1850 and the other at 1930 hours.

On steaming out No.1 had about four stops before reaching Redfern through certain people pulling the communication cords. Eventually they got under way and reached Dubbo at 0830 the next day. Upon disembarkation the unit formed up and marched three miles along the Obley Road to the camp.

On arrival at camp, the rumours were current that the unit would be leaving for overseas the following day or on Monday.

This was confirmed by all personnel being ordered to pack up and the receipt of new equipment. Our neighbours, the Ammunition Unit, took over guard duties and immediately after breakfast on Sunday 29th Sept. a full Battalion Parade was held.

Reinforcements had arrived that day from Walgrove to bring the unit up to full fighting strength.

The unit departed Dubbo Camp at 2200 hrs and were farewelled at the station by many leading citizens who came to express their good wishes to the Battalion.

The train journey back to Sydney was a long one, but they finally arrived at Pyrmont Wharf at 1100 hrs on Monday 30th Sept.

After leaving the train the unit, with the exception of "D" Coy, were checked and then walked the gangway to board the S.S. "Johann De Witt".

"D" Coy were sent by train to Melbourne where they boarded the S.S. "New Zealand".



BRIEF HISTORY OF THE 2/1 PIONEER BATTALION

To be presented in parts by H. Montague.

Part 1 (March 78 Pioneer News) dealt with Unit being formed at Greta, June 1940, the units final leave Sept. 1940, and embarkation Monday 30th Sept.

PART 2 — UNIT ARRIVAL AT DUBBO

On Monday 9th Sept 1940 the unit arrived at Dubbo Railway Station after a 14 hour journey from Greta in two special trains.

One train was late, but it was decided to keep to the arrangement of a march through the town with the first contingent as the streets were packed with the townspeople waiting to welcome the unit.

After forming up, the Troops moved off headed by our band and led by Major "Nugget" Neal and what a tremendous ovation and enthusiastic reception they were given as they passed down Darling, Talbragar and Macquarie Streets.

Passing the Town Hall, the Mayor of Dubbo took the salute from Major Neal and then continued on to Victoria Park where all gear was stacked.

The unit was then ushered into a large hall where Ladies and volunteers served a very enjoyable meal and light refreshments. During this meal the Major and the Band proceeded back to the station where they met the second contingent. They too were given a tumultuous welcome as they marched through the streets to the hall where the meal awaited them.

After the whole Battalion had been fed the Mayor officially welcomed the unit to the town of Dubbo on behalf of its citizens and congratulated Lt. Col. McGillicuddy on the unit's great military bearing they had displayed during their march through the town. He stated the unit would be honoured guests by all.

In replying, our Colonel thanked the Mayor and the citizens of Dubbo for their reception and hospitality so generously given.

After our Band had given an impromptu Concert to the crowd we marched off to our camp. It was a historic occasion which I feel still lives in the memory of both the citizens of Dubbo and members of the unit, for we were made very welcome.

PART 3 — BOARDING S.S. JOHANN DE WITT. Monday 30th October, 1940.

After all embarkation formalities had been complied with, the unit finally proceeded up the gangway of the S.S. Johann De Witt.

Following the routine of being checked and numbered the members were conducted to the converted ships cargo holds where they were to sleep for the duration of the voyage.

At 1430 hours a full parade of all military personnel was held on the various decks and were addressed by Lord Gowrie, Governor of N.S.W.

The adjoining wharf was crowded with wives, relatives and friends who had come to farewell the ship. The Eastern Command Band were playing and it was a really wonderful carnival gathering until about 1630 hours when the mooring lines were cast off and the ship got under way, leaving the Pyrmont wharf with tremendous cheering from the multitude of well wishers

However the ship did not immediately proceed on the voyage, but anchored at 1815 hours in the area of Shark Island to refill oil tanks. This was completed about 2300 hours and then she was on her way and on clearing the heads, met up with HMAS Perth who was waiting to escort the Johann De Witt to the Middle East.

Brown; Majors: Harold White, Norm Neal; Capts: Stan Goulston, Bob Egan, Harry Tope, Padre Dransfield, Dave Coleman, Jeff Graham, Herb Braddon, Vic Tunbridge, George Patterson, Tom Ledgerwood and Bill Proven; Lieuts: Rod Pegg, Harry Ellis, Chas Richardson, Bob Wilson, Gordon Osborn, Barry Watts, Harry Hughes, Bill Robertson, Frank Allan, Jock Gillespie, Robby Farlow, "Lofty" Barlow, Wally Copp, John Riley, Ted Carter, Jack McAdam, John Gilchrist, Johnny Wheeler, Henry Nicholls and John Tooker

PART 4 — NURSING STAFF

When the troopship H.M.T. SS Johann De Witt sailed from Sydney in Oct. 1940 the ship was loaded with Military personnel including the 2/1 Pioneers, except 'D' Coy who had departed from Melbourne

The Medical section on the ship who were also bound for the Middle East were indeed a most efficient branch of the Services and certainly worked hard to maintain the health standards on the ship.

There were four nurses in this group and they were Sisters Vera Hamilton, Sue Malcolm, Kitty Tidd and Gladys Sherman.

Over the last few months I have conducted a long search and many enquiries as to the whereabouts of the four sisters and have been successful in locating all except Gladys Sherman.

On introducing myself to each of the ladies with the best wishes of the Association they were really delighted to hear about our members and their doings, for they all had happy memories in meeting the 2/1 Pioneers on the ship. In particular they said what great enjoyment they had derived from the concerts our band performed while on the ship. They even remembered such items as Wind mills turning — nursie, Col Bogey.

It was nice chatting to these ladies and as they were most interested in the Association I have contacted the Secretary and arranged to have their names put on the mailing list. I explained about all our functions and with the Committees permission have invited them to our Reunions.

It was well worth the effort in locating these ladies and I was thrilled with the way they welcomed me on behalf of the Association.

Left Australia on April 15th and had 4½ months overseas, and we would have liked more

GALLIPOLI — ANZAC DAY 1978

On my recent overseas trip one of the most moving and emotional experiences that has ever happened to me occured whilst on a cruise of The Greek Islands and Instanbul.

Leaving Instanbul at noon on April 24th we cruised into The Dardanels and with dusk closing in we passed the town of Gallipoli, a surprise to me was the much larger town than I had imagined. The Dardanels narrowed here and at the narrowest section we arrived opposite the landing beaches of April 25th, 1915 with the cliffs behind. A large marble memorial has been placed on the cliff top, brilliantly floodlit with figures of servicemen around the sides. Here the ship's Purser came on the loudspeakers telling the passengers the history of the landing in four languages commencing with English. The ship was Greek but the Purser gave the Australians top priority for their bravery and tenacity under impossible conditions and like me the Australians on board all felt very proud of our nationality. Even though Gallipoli was a defeat with enormous loss of Allied lives we all know that our A.I.F. wrote history and we came of age in this battle. Of course the Purser mentioned The British, French and New Zealand forces who fought here.

The fading light in which I saw this area would have been similar to that which our gallant A.I.F. would have seen as they stormed ashore on Anzac Day 1915.

I consider this trip to be one of the most wonderful experiences in my life being 63 years to the day since our forces were also on boats in these waters awaiting landing.

THE SERVICE PENSION

The Budget resulted in an increase of Service pension to \$53.20 per week for a single person and \$88.70 per week for a married couple.

The single person may have an extra weekly income of \$20 and the combined extra weekly income of both veteran and spouse is \$34.50.

Only one-half of any Disability Pension received is treated as income for the means test for Service Pension.

Fringe Benefits: Eligibility for fringe benefits will be lost where income (including the FULL amount of any Disability pension received) equals or exceeds \$57.50 per week for a married couple and \$33 per week for a single person.

An ex-serviceman who has served in a theatre of war and is permanently unemployable, because of war disabilities may obtain the service pension before the age of 60 years.

An ex-serviceman may obtain the Service Pension at the age of 60 years if he has served in a theatre of war by applying to the Dept of Veterans Affairs, Box 3994 G.P.O., Sydney, firstly for confirmation of the fact he did serve in a theatre of war. This confirmation could take up to four months. The letter should take the form as follows: "I served in the Wartime Forces as number....between (enlistment on)....and (discharge on).....l was at......on......and married at......on..... Would you please check my service records and advise me if my service includes service in a theatre of war please."

The letter will produce a reply in time to plan your pension application.

For a full summary of rates of pensions, allowances and benefits, write to the Dept of Veterans Affairs, Box 3994 G.P.O., Sydney.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE 2/1 PIONEER BATTALION

To be presented in parts by H. Montague

Part 1 March 1978 dealt with the unit being formed at Greta, June 1940, final leave 1940 and embarkation Sept. 1940.

Part 2 dealt with arrival at Dubbo 1940.
Part 3 dealt with Boarding the Johann De Witt
Oct. 1940 and Part 4 dealt with the Nursing
staff on board the Johann De Witt.

PART 5 — DEPARTURE FROM AUSTRALIA

On leaving Sydney on Monday 30th September, 1940 we had the cruiser HMAS Perth as escort and as the Johann De Witt ran, into rough seas many of us who had not been afloat before certainly felt its effects.

At midday on Wednesday 2nd October we met up with the H.M.T. "New Zealand" which had sailed from Melbourne with a full complement of troops including our "D" Company. Greetings were sent across from our lines to the "New Zealand". After a more smoother voyage across the Great Australian Bight land was heralded on Monday 7th October which turned out to be Fremantle.

With our sister ship we tied up at the main wharf alongside the "Mauretania". Leave was granted for a few hours for those who could be spared and it was really nice to get ones feet on ground again. A great welcome was extended to all troops by the townspeople.

Next day a full parade of the whole ships complement of military personnel was held and after this, with the New Zealand we continued our voyage to the Middle East. We were again

escorted by the Perth until relieved by the H.M.A.S. "Canberra".

On leaving us the Perth's band played "Roll out the Barrel" whilst our troops manned the ships side and cheered the navy fellows for the wonderful job they had done in escorting us across that vast ocean. In reply the Pioneers Band played "Advance Australia Fair" and the traditional "Hearts of Oak" as a tribute to them.

Our convoy after a very smooth voyage entered Colombo harbour early on Wednesday 18th October and once the usual formalities were dispensed with and we were paid in rupees, leave personnel were taken ashore.

Here we were formed up and marched through the city to the British Army Headquarters at Grail Barracks where we were greatly welcomed. On arrival here we were lectured by an officer on the conditions of the town and the recreation facilities that had been arranged for us, such as tours and sightseeing of the city.

On Thursday 21st October our convoy departed from this famous port and after farewelling the H.M.A.S. Canberra with all troops lining the decks, we were joined by the H.M.S. Caleden.

Later on our two ships joined up with about eight other vessels and five escort vessels including the H.M.A.S. Parramatta. As we were in the extreme danger area all hands were ordered to remain on deck fully fitted out with lifebelts and water bottles full.

Every available watch was kept for the hostile aircraft which was expected, but thankfully did not eventuate

REPATRIATION SERVICES PENSION ACT

This particular Parliamentry Law was introduced and became effective during 1935 by the then Prime Minister Mr Joe Lyons, UAP Government and was, "that a service pension is an income tested social welfare type payment, the same as to the Department of Social Security Age and Invalid Pensions".

It is payable to an eligible veteran who is permanently unemployable, or who has attained 60 years of age if a male or 55 years if a female, to cover the indefinate and intangible effects of war service which could cause premature aging and the loss of capacity to earn a living. The eligibility conditions under which a female veteran may be granted a service pension are more lenient than those which apply to a male veteran.

To emphasize this, a male veteran must have served in a theatre of War before eligibility for the grant of a service pension may be conceded, whereas a female veteran may be entitled if she served abroad, and not necessarily in a theatre of War, or embarked for service abroad.

UNOFFICIAL HISTORY OF THE 5TH A.I.F. PIONEER COY. 2ND A.I.F. some of the boys were detailed under the b

- This was the official name of this unit bestowed upon it by the powers that be at Victoria Barracks, Melbourne. I could never understand the need for the letters A.I.F. in the name but, who am I, a mere footslogger that I should have the nerve to question decisions of the top brass. The boys who comprised this unit had their own names such as The Forgotten Fifth, The Filthy Fifth, etc., etc.
- The allotments to the unit allowed for one vehicle and, after a lot of talk and persuasion, B.O.D. Transport Section, Seymour, finally came good with a Ute and very good use was made of it while we had it. By the way, I don't recall returning it to B.O.D. when cleaning up after unit was disbanded. Wonder where it got to? Would not be surprised to learn that some enterprising soul had "flogged" it to some of the local squatocracy.
- Talking of that Ute reminds me that when we acquired it, I was given the job of getting all the paper work, so beloved of beaurocracy. In order: Work orders, Daily running sheet, Log, book, Petrol requisitions, etc., and when I had completed same Lt J. Richards (remember "Fat Jack") appointed himself O.C. Transport. He appointed a certain young hopeful surname Preston, as the driver and I was given charge of No.1 Platoon. I am not naming which of the Preston Brothers was driver, they can argue that out themselves.
- We had with us a chap Jack Gibbs whose father was a poultry farmer, and the mere mention of egg powder to "Gibbsie" was like "waving a red rag at a bull", especially when we had been on a steady diet of bully beef, biscuits (Army type — dog) and egg powder for several weeks, and that leads up to another story.
- Some of the boys tired of the bull & beef—Egg powder diet commandeered the Ute and went on a foraging expedition into the East Murchison-Nagambie country. They arrived back late at night with a truckload of live meat which was promptly slaughtered, skinned, cleaned and in the cooking pots in double quick time and was a very welcome change in diet. This was in the days before Myxomatosis and the dreaded 1080. But I am not committing myself when I say the load was not entirely "underground mutton" as there happened to be a few turkeys and ducks in this country as well as sheep and cattle. The load comprised a variety.
- We had with us, at this time, a chap named "Splinter" Lowrie who came over to the 2/2 Pioneers and was allocated to "C" Coy. When we were holding a position near Shaggy Ridge, an artillery O.P. warned us that a Jap patrol was headed our way so the "Coy" promptly set up a welcoming party. As the Japs approached one of our Bren Gunners became somewhat excited when he got them in his sight and let off a short burst of shots. The Japs apparently didn't appreciate this kind of welcome so promptly "about turned" and high tailed for home. In their hurry one of them dropped his sword and "Splinter" Lowrie, being smart on his feet, was out of his fox hole, swiped up the sword and was back in his fox hole before the sound of the shots had finished echoing around the hills.
- Keith Faure and "Ginger" Gay were a couple of the boys who made the transfer to the 2/2 Pnrs. While in the 5th they were paired off into the same platoon and became fairly close mates but got split up in the 2/2 Pnrs. Keith, I think, was in H.Q. Coy whilst Ginger was in C Coy. While still dug in to hold the perimeter position mentioned in the previous paragraph, Ginger and

some of the boys were detailed under Lieut White to patrol forward and try to find out if any Japs were in the area.

Sure enough they found out. When rounding a bend in the track they ran slap bang into a Jap ambush. In the hurry to get out of trouble Lieut White lost his hat and stopped to pick it up and that was the last ever seen of him (refer "History of 2/2 Pioneer Battalion" by E.A. Aitken). It seems a strange coincidence that, while C Coy was hanging on to this perimeter position, both occasions, when contact was made with the nemy, involved boys from the 5th Pioneers. I met Keith one day in 1947 in Middle Park, Vic., we had a yarn for a while but he had not seen "Ginger" for some time. I have not seen either of them since.

- A couple of triers from South Merbein. McLean Brothers, made me smile one day. I was making out 7 day leave passes and these two, to try and get extra leave, put over a sad story. about the train arriving at Mildura in the morning, which was true. They would have to waste the day in the town before they could catch the bus that would take them home. They would then have to catch an early bus on their return thus spending another day of their precious leave waiting for the train. What these young innocents did not know was the fact that I had some years previously gone to the San Mateo Ave., Mildura, State School with the lad who was destined to become the founder and owner of the Mildura District Pioneer bus service. So I was able to explain the bus timetable to them. Others who tried the same story was a lad named "Bluey" Hansen from Timboon with the tale that he would have to catch a bus from Camperdown. Not realising that I was aware of the fact that a train stopped at Timboon Rly Stn as that was the end of the line. As I was not footing the bill for their fares or pay and, on the principle that "it was worth a try", I tacked a couple of extra days on to the passes, "Bluey" came across with us to the 2/2 Pioneers and was, if memory serves me rightly, in the Mortar Platoon, the McLean Brothers were transfered to a Signal Corps and I met them once when we first landed at Tsili-Tsili, N.G., and then, a few years after the War, in Mildura, V. about 1948.
- Another person whom I have never seen or heard of since those days is Capt. McQueen, Coy C.O. He was a very mild mannered man who was quite contented to leave the running of the unit to a couple of officers and N.C.O.s and was very happy if nobody worried him. I have often wondered if any of you meet up with him.
- Whilst waiting at railway gates at Moorabbin Station, Vic. to open after a train had passed through a "gentle tap" on my shoulder caused me to turn and face Tom Indian. Tom came across to the 2/2 Pioneers with a lot more of us. At the time of meeting him at the railway gates Tom was manager of the Moorabbin Branch of the C.B.C., this happened in 1954.
- Mention has been made on several occasions in these yarns about the 5th Pioneers of reference to "The History of 2/2 Pioneer Btn" by E.A. Aitken. So, not possessing a copy of this book, my thanks go to Lionel Fullarton, president, Orbost District R.S.L. (Vic) for the loan of his copy. Lionel was not in the 5th Pioneers but was in "HQ" Coy 2/2 Pioneers.
