#### THE ODE

Laurence Binyon who wrote "The Ode To The Fallen" was a stretcher bearer in France during the first World War. Born in England in 1869 he died in 1943. Laurence Binyon was a poet, a keeper of paints and drawings of the British Museum, and he was an authority on Oriental Art.

His experiences as a stretcher bearer moved him to write his "Ode To The Fallen" one verse of which has became a universal eulogy for the exservicemen and women when they meet and remember departed comrades.

The reciting of the Ode each day in ex-service clubs affects people in different ways. To some it is probably only a routine to be endured, but to others it does stir up a feeling of reverence and possibly memories of comrades and events of years gone by, but do we stop to think of the meaning of the words as Binyon wrote them.

"They Shall Grow Not Old, As We That Are Left Grow Old". We remember people as we saw them last, and those who died so young and so many years ago, we still remember as young and virile, while those friends who have grown old alongside us, we shall remember when they are gone, as old and less active persons as when we first met them.

"Age Shall Not Weary Them Nor The Years (Contemn) Condemn". The trials and tribulations of life can no longer sicken or pall them. As the years go by we will still remember them in high esteem with respect for the cause for which they died. They will never be despised or scorned.

As originally written by Laurence Binyon the word was "CONTEMN" a word very little used these days. The word "CONDEMN" has by general usage taken its place. "CONTEMN": Despise, scorn, disdain, hold cheap or unworthy. "CONDEMN": Blame, censure, reprove.

"At The Going Down of The Sun, And In The Morning We Will Remember Them". They will be remembered somewhere by someone each minute of the day. They are enshrined by our memory forever.

#### THE CEREMONY OF THE ODE

Although this ceremony has only been adopted by Ex-Service Clubs since World War II, its history is reported to go back to World War I.

The Chairman of the Big Ben Council one time was a Major Pole, who was wounded in Palestine, taken prisoner and later escaped to England.

The Silent Minute".

The chimes and strokes of Big Ben in the tower of the Houses of Parliament in London at 9 o'clock each evening is used to signal the "Silent Minute". This signal was first broadcast by the B.B.C. on November 10, 1940 and is still broadcast each evening at 9 p.m. to millions of people.

The ceremony of "The Ode" is also held nightly at the MENIM GATE in Flanders. The Menim Gate is a British War Memorial astride the Menim Road. It was here around Ypres that three great battles were fought on the Belgian frontier with France in the first World War. There are 55,000 names inscribed on the monument in its hugh hall and 6176 of them are Australians (Who died there).

This then is a brief resume of "The Ode" and The "Silent Minute". Can we put this silence to good use? The power of silence is greater than you think, depending on what you do with it. The Ode originally had seven verses, and it is the fourth verse which we know so well.

"They shall grow not old,
As we that are left grow old.
Age shall not weary them,
Nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun
And in the morning
We Will Remember Them."

## HISTORY OF THE CENOTAPH, SYDNEY

Following a request from one of our members in reference to the history of the Cenotaph in Martin Place, Sydney, interviews were arranged with the R.S.L., Sydney City Council, and the "Sydney Morning Herald" and every possible assistance was given by all concerned.

The word Cenotaph means an empty tomb or a monument erected in honour of a person who is buried elsewhere. The wording on the Memorial is therefore appropriate — "To Our Glorious Dead".

In the early days of 1920 the general public had settled down to days of peace after the 1914-18 War and with the return to normal civilian life of the country's fighting men, the public wanted an appropriate memorial in the heart of the city.

In the R.S.L. records, the first reference to the erection of a Hallowed Shrine at the present site appears in 1924 when mention was made of a sub committee, and a generous offer by Mr. Hugh Macintosh, managing director of "The Sunday Times" to give publicity to the project.

However it does seem that the inspiration and initiative for the memorial can be attributed to Mr. Fred Davison, a metropolitan Vice President of the R.S.L.

As this movement was making good progress and with the newspaper publicity assisting, a number of prominent citizens were invited by the State Secretary of the R.S.L. to form a committee to further the project. When formed this was known as the Sydney Cenotaph Committee.

The committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Justice Ferguson of the Supreme Court held their first meeting on 24th February 1925 and the following resolution was carried: "That steps be taken for the erection of a memorial in Martin Place in memory of N.S.W. Fallen Comrades".

On 13th May 1925 it was decided that a deputation wait on the Premier, Sir George Fuller asking for assurance from the Government that they would support the erection of the memorial.

The assurance was agreed to by the Government.

A few weeks after the deputation a general election took place with the result that Mr. J.F. Lang became Premier.

The subject of design was not on a competitive basis and the committee asked the Premier, Mr. Lang, to agree to the Government commissioning Sir Bertram Mackennall to undertake the designing and erection of the Memorial. For this purpose Mr. Lang indicated his Government would provide 10,000 pounds.

#### DORMAN LONG, CONTRACTORS

In May, 1927, the committee decided on the title of "The Martin Place Memorial Committee" and later that month met with Dr. Bradfield and Mr. Martin of Dorman Long & Co. who were contractors for the erection of the Memorial. This firm also contracted for the erection of the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

The masonry work for the Memorial was cut, hewn and dressed at the Moruya quarry of Dorman Long and consisted of Moruya grain. The overall size is 9ft 6½ inches and the base 22 ft long.

On 2nd August 1927 the ship arrived in Sydney from Moruya with the huge block of granite which weighed over seventeen tons. It was indeed a spectacle to witness the team of twenty horses hauling this terrific load from the dockside to Martin Place. The overall task of unloading, hauling and embedding onto mortar in position took only three hours.

The Dedication took place on 8th August, 1927, and was presided over by the Governor of N.S.W. Sir Dudley De Chair. Premier Lang delivered the speech of Dedication. Mr. F. Davison of the R.S.L. was appointed Custodian.

At a meeting of the committee on 19th December, 1928 it was resolved that the unveiling of the Cenatoph would take place on 21st February, 1929, which was the anniversary of the day the Australian Light Horse entered Jericho City during the Palestine campaign.

During the second and third weeks of February, 1929, work proceeded according to schedule in fitting the bronze statues of the Sailor and Soldier to their respective pedestals.

The model of the soldier selected was that of William P. Derby, Regimental number 6 of the 15th Infantry Battalion and the 4th Field Ambulance. He passed away in Queensland in January 1936 aged 66 years.

The model of the sailor selected was that of Leading Signalman John William Varcoe of the R.A.N. He was born at Baker's Swamp N.S.W. on 20th July, 1897, and educated at Dubbo Public School. He enlisted in the navy on the 3rd June, 1913 and served on H.M.A.S. Pioneer from December 1914 to November 1916 then transferred to H.M.A.S. Parramatta until November 1919. he was awarded the D.S.M. on 17th May 1918. He passed away in October 1948.

#### CENOTAPH CUSTODIAN APPOINTED

The Cenotaph was unveiled on 21st February, 1929, by the Governor of N.S.W. Sir Dudley De Chair who placed the one and only laurel wreath on the Cenotaph. Addresses were given by Premier Bavin and Sir John Monash.

Since 1928 a Custodian has been appointed annually by the R.S.L.

At least once a week the Custodian removes from the Cenotaph all dead and withered tributes and detaches the cards and ribbons. The cards are kept for another use and after being laundered the ribbons are distributed by the R.S.L. Women's Auxiliary to ex-service women in mental hospitals and to girls in orphanages — all for the use of hair ribbons. Thus from tokens of sorrow these ribbons bring joy to many others — young and old.

An arrangement also exists whereby Rover Scouts of the N.S.W. Scout Association voluntarily clean and scrub down the Cenotaph with soap and water at two monthly intervals. In consequence it continues to have the best appearance of any Monument in Sydney.

#### CONCORD HOSPITAL

The Repatriation General Medical Centre at Concord is now equipped with a unique night landing system for helicopters, thus giving it greater urgent capabilities.

This new system was officially opened by the Minister for Veteran Affairs, Senator Arthur Gietzelt on 26th January, 1984 who performed the opening ceremony of what is known as the Australian designed, "Rotorstrobe Navaid System".

The new modern arrangement is a portable system which could guide up to six helicopters into the Medical Centres ground should a disaster strike.

The equipment gives approach and landing positions on the helipad. Incidently it won a major prize in 1981 on the ABC Programme "The Inventors".

R.G.H. Concord, although Federal funded through the Department of Veteran Affairs, plays a major role in the N.S.W. medical system, and is also part of the Armed Services Medical Programme.

In the past, night time helicopter landings have been assisted by ambulance headlights trained across the sports ground.

Under the present system, pilots will be able to see the main beacon at the Medical Centre from up to thirty kilometres away and then approach, under guidance, to their assigned positions on the landing pad. —HARRY MONTAGUE, Reporter

Up on the mountainside, the ridge ran down at a fairly steep angle and it did not take long to find out which end the noisiest bloke in the group had settled. Joey Blanch was camped at a table near the top and made sure everyone knew what he had to say — all day.

The conservationists (and that included almost everyone — with the exception of a lady or three) were in their glory as, when the food hampers were opened, out of the bush came a number of very well fed goannas. They caused some consternation at first but the animals were not concerned, and wandered about from group to group receiving enough food to keep them going for another week.

Clancy Scholes and Laurie (3 Course) Kelly took over the role of "nature study advisors" and gave interested groups detailed (and I mean **detailed**) information on the habits of goannas in their natural environment. Laurie's description of the method used by an attacking goanna of clamping its teeth around human fingers for instance, was well worth recording, particularly the bit about the creature's "sawing" action as it chews through the fingers.

## VALE—EDDIE AITKEN, O.B.E., E.D.

Edward Faucett Aitken was born on 30th January, 1913. He joined the A.I.F. and the 2/2nd Pioneer Battalion on 16th May, 1940 and was immediately given command of "A" Company with the rank of Captain.

He was taken P.O.W. at MERDJAYOUN ON 17th June, 1941 with several members of "A Company. He was taken via a tremendously tortuous route to Italy and repatriated to Beyrouth on 30th August, 1941.

Eddie was promoted to Major on 7th November, 1941. He was in command of the training battalion when the main body embarked on the "Orcades" on 31st January, 1942. Eddie returned to Australia and was one of the main-springs in the re-formation of the battalion.

He saw service in the Ramu Valley, New Guinea, with the battalion and was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel subsequently. Eddie had the honour of commanding the battalion at the landing and campaign in Balikpapan, taking over from Lieutenant Colonel Davis, who was evacuated sick. He was discharged on 20th November. 1946

He rejoined the Army and after a period was G.S.O.I. Southern Command, he was seconded to the United Nations as military observer in Jakarta in November, 1949. He was subsequently appointed a Military Attache in Bangkok in 1957, after which term he became G.S.O.I. Northern Command and resigned from the Army in 1961.

It must be recorded that Eddie wrote "The Story Of The 2/2nd Australian Pioneer Battalion", which was published in 1953. He was also awarded the Order of the British Empire on 1st January, 1959.

Eddie became Regional Manager of the Snowy Mountains Authority at Island Bend and Eucumbene. After a term as Senior Personnel Officer with Austral Standard Cables, he retired.

In April, 1975, he went to live in Burleigh Heads, Queensland, in Anzac Parade (where else?).

He died suddenly on 2nd August, 1984, and in the opinion of many people, was the battalion's most distinguished soldier. The battalion was represented at his funeral by Leo Cornelius and Pat Sherman. He is survived by his widow, Gwen — a talented and gracious hostess — and daughters, Pam and Diana.

Eddie wrote and delivered an Anzac Day address in 1962 which opened by saying — "I personally subscribe to the belief that, despite what theologists say, there is only one sin against nature, and, that is, to be afraid".

The passing of this great man is a loss to all Pioneers.
