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SAD LOSS OF PRESIDENT

The Association was saddened by the sudden passing of Jack "Mick" Dodson on 27th November, 1984, at Concord Hospital after a short illness.

A graveside service was conducted at Rookwood Cemetery on 29th November and was attended by twenty nine members and their ladies. Also in attendance was a very large representation of members of the Rats of Tobruk Association. Fairfield Bowling Club and R.S.L. Club, Combined Services Club and Five Dock R.S.L. Club. Amongst the mourners were the Federal Member for Lowe. the Hon. Michael Maher, M.H.R., and Councillor Ben Wooden, representing Sir Colin Hines, President R.S.L. of N.S.W., and their State Council.

During the service, many members of various organisations spoke on behalf of their clubs in paying homage to their departed friend and

"Mick" served his country during World War II with the 2/1st Pioneer Battalion. After enlisting in August 1940, he took part in the Middle East, New Guinea and Borneo campaigns. Whilst in the Middle East, he served for seven months in Tobruk and in New Guinea was on active duty over the Kokoda Trail in the Owen Stanley Ranges. He was discharged from the Army in Sydney in September 1945.

After being on the Committee of the 2/1-2/2 Pioneer Battalions Association since "Mick"became Vice President in 1966 and in April 1973, was elected President - still holding this position at the time of his death.

For outstanding services to the Association he was awarded Life Membership of the Association at the Dubbo Reunion in September 1980.

In 1977, "Mick" also became N.S.W. President of the Rats of Tobruk Association, a position he also still held when he passed away. He was also Vice President of the Rats of Tobruk Federal Council, Councillor on the Australian Veterans and Defence Services Council, a Director of Fairfield Bowling Club and delegate to the N.S.W. Bowling Association.

His special project was the War Veterans Home at Narrabeen which he visited at least once a month

to bring news to the members of his many associations. If any ex-serviceman needed assistance, "Mick" was always at hand to lend aid when needed. It was announced at the graveside service that "Mick" had left his Fairfield home to the War Veterans Homes.

The passing of Jack "Mick" Dodson whilst saddening the Association and friends, will leave an outstanding example for others to follow. He was a big man, with a big heart, doing a big job.

His loss is indeed a sad one and his wise counsel on matters pertaining to the welfare of those he loved and cared for will be greatly missed. Our most sincere sympathies were extended to his family of brothers and his sister - may their sorrow be eased a little by the knowledge that so many others share their loss with them.

After a lot of research Harry Montague came up with the following details.

The 2/1 Special Pioneer Company was formed at Dubbo on 2nd January 1942 and consisted of members from the 9th Pioneer Training Battalion. On being gazetted the Pioneer Company was classified as being reinforcements for the 2/1 and 2/2 Pioneer Battalions.

Whilst carrying out training at Dubbo the Army disbanded the Pioneer Company, as the 2/1st Pioneer Battalion were on their way home from the Middle East and the 2/2 Pioneer Battalion were prisoners of war in Java.

The personnel were distributed to the 2/11 Royal Aust. Engineers and to the 2/2 Field Company, who under the command of Major Bond, an original 2/2nd were transferred to Darwin.

After the war these people formed an Association of their own, known as 2/1-2/2 Special Pioneer Companies, and from time to time have advertised their Reunions in the Sydney papers.

PIONEER

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LAE AIRPORT - By MAX SATTLER Silent Memorial to Our Soldiers

LAE (Nadzab) airport sits silent and unused on the floodplains of the Markham River about 45 km behind P-NG's second largest city.

Built with Australian money in the mid 1970s this international standard airport at Nadzab could easily be mistaken as a monument to Australian soldiers who parachuted onto the exact site on September 5, 1943. They were the advance guard of engineers sent to construct a crude airfield to allow troops of the 7th Division to be brought in for the assault on Japanese-held Lae.

After the Japanese were turned back on the Kokoda Trail in September, 1942, the retaking of Lae became the focus of General MacArthur's plans.

Airlifting the 7th Division into Nadzab was one third of a three part plan. The 7th would advance down the Markham Valley, the 3rd Division would move in on nearby Salamaua and the 9th Division would be landed on beaches east of Lae.

General Blamey instructed the 7th to play "second fiddle" to the 9th which was to have the

honour of retaking Lae.

A massive force of 300 aircraft from Port Moresby was used in the move to establish an airfield at Nadzab. And how suitable this spot was. The wide expanse of flat land and the open approaches on all sides made Nadzab ideal.

RSL President in Papua New Guinea, Norm Osborn, told me, "The main runway of Nadzab Airport is the old No. 1 strip put down by the advance party which was parachuted in." He added, "You know, most of those chaps were having their first jump."

Wartime Nadzáb was a hive of activity in the days which followed the first parachute landings. Within three days several thousand troops of the 7th Division had been flown in, mainly in those faithful workhorses, DC3s. Then the rains came, preventing further landings for almost a week.

When the rain stopped a pent-up force of almost 200 aircraft arrived at Nadzab the following day with back up troops.

The push toward Lae was on in earnest.

Intent on holding Lae, the Japanese used every tactic they knew to stem the advance of the 7th Division. They skirmished with the Australians in cat and mouse encounters, set ambushes in the thick jungle undergrowth and dug in to fight tenaciously. Japanese field artillery constantly bombarded the Australians.

Won Victoria Cross

During a particularly fierce engagement, Private Kelliher won a Victoria Cross when, with complete disregard for his own life, he wiped out a Japanese machine gun post and dragged a wounded mate to safety.

Despite General Blamey's order, General Vasey, commander of the 7th, had a secret ambition to be first into Lae.

He was probably not aware that the favoured 9th Division advancing along the coast east of Lae was having to contend with two flooded rivers as well as the Japanese. The Busu River in particular was a raging torrent from the heavy tropical rains which beset the entire campaign to recapture Lae. The 9th was stopped in its tracks by the swollen

Busu for several days.

Now within 5 miles of Lae, the 7th Division found the Japanese resistance starting to fall away. Vasey quickly recognised that the enemy was fighting token rearquard actions to allow the remnants of its garrison to flee into the mountains behind Lae. He motivated his troops to press harder.

Norm Osborn told me. "They moved a shade too quickly because the leading troops were straffed by allied aircraft close to Lae. They weren't supposed to be there and were mistaken for Japanese.

He also recounted how the 7th Division was led into Lae by an Australian brigadier brandishing his pistol and urging his men to quicken their pace.

The 25th Brigade of the 7th entered Lae at 11 a.m. on September 16, 1943, just 11 days after engineers had parachuted onto the Markham River flats at Nadzab

Later the same day the ill-fated 9th Division arrived

The wide Markham flats on which deserted Lae (Nadzabi) Airport stands is a favourite place for souvenir hunters

To me the most obvious reminder of this great wartime airfield is the impressive but silent airport which now marks the spot. Its main building and control tower protrude like sentinals on the open ground which at the height of the allied offensive in New Guinea was the world's busiest airfield.

Gavin Todd 2/2 wrote to the "Sun" pointing out inaccuracies in the above article and his letter is printed below. He also received a letter from Max Sattler apologising for the inaccuracies but that his intentions were good. – FDITOR

The Editor, The Sun Newspaper Dear Sir.

The article "Lae Airport — Silent Memorial to Our Soldiers" by Max Sattler in the Sun on Thursday, May 16, is full of inaccuracies.

As a journalist, Max Sattler should at least confirm the facts and not rely on garbled accounts such as he received from RSL President in Papua New Guinea, Norm Osborn.

The paratroopers who jumped over Nadzab air strip on September 5, 1943, were Americans of the 503 Parachute Regiment. The only Australians to jump were a few intrepid volunteers from the 2/4 Field Regt, with two 25-pounder guns. There were no Engineer paratroopers that day.

Apart from the American paratroopers, the Nadzab operation was a 2/2 Pioneer Battalion show. The engineers at Nadzab were part of the main force of Pioneers, who were air-lifted from Port Moresby to Tsili Tsili from whence they marched, with 800 native carriers, for five days to the Markham River. At the same time a select party of Pioneers and Engineers ferried boats down the Watut River into the Markham to provide a crossing for the main body.

They joined the main body opposite the Nadzab strip, and crossed the Markham (up to one mile wide and with many channels) to link up with the gallant American paratroopers.

Finally, the Nadzab strip was not constructed it already existed but required clearing of obstacles and kunai grass, and checking for land mines, to enable 7 Division to be flown in.

Mr Sattler can check this information from the official history, "The Story of the 2/2 Pioneer Battalion." Yours sincerely, G. TODD

However, I made it to Grafton in time for Ramornie Handicap Day and by the end of the day I was sorry I had not stayed in Mayfield. I backed up the next day, Grafton Cup Day, and fortunately got it all back and I stayed for the following Saturday and Wednesday, South Grafton Cup Day, and overall finished a few "schooners" in front. That's why I can eventually get around to Item 2 and send you a few

The main thing is to tell you of the Pioneers I met

 all 2/1, all at the races, and all old originals.
 TED "NOBBY" FELTON — Never misses a race meeting. They call him the "Starter". The gates don't fly open until he is on the course. Also met his lovely wife, Jean. The last year has not been a good one for "Nobby" as he had a coronary, was discharged and home for two weeks when he had another one and was re-admitted. However, he is OK again now, lost a little bit of weight and looks OK so it looks like the Grafton races will be able to continue.

JACK "BANJO" MARTIN. Still a resident of Casino, but never misses a big meeting at Grafton. Like "Nobby" he is in the same category as the "Starter" at Casino. He looks well but has had a few arterial problems and has had several by-passes. Wishes to be remembered to all his old mates 3. FRED WHEATON and his good wife Jean. Both look well and Fred shows no ill effects from his heart by-pass operation. Fred is still Vice-President at Sawtell RSL which is now a very nice club and a pretty big operation. Both Fred and Jean spend a lot of time golfing, beach fishing, bowling and an hour or two a week at the RSL Club. Visited Fred on a couple of occasions at Sawtell, sampled Jean's pumpkin scones and coffee and had a game of golf with Fred at Sawtell. It blew a gale and was bitterly cold. Jean did not play because of the weather and I don't blame her. Niné holes was enough for us and we adjourned to a warmer spot and a more pleasant occupation. Fred still enjoys a drop of "Red Mill" Rum. Fred, Jean, Esme and I have made arrangements to go to the "Rats" World Reunion at Surfers Paradise in April 1986.

Fred was hitting the golf ball pretty well so tell Lake and Whitely they had better get in some practise.

4. BILL "BLUEY" WADE — Bill has been making. the pilgrimage to Grafton each year for the past 12 or 14 years with a couple of his mates from Buladelah. This year they tried their luck at the Brisbane Racing Carnival but came back to Grafton licking their wounds and I don't think they had fully recovered when they left for home on the Friday the day after the Grafton Cup. Bill is still on the executive of Buladelah Bowling Club, a club he helped to create and would appreciate a visit from any of the boys who may be passing through. Can be found there almost any day from 4 p.m. onwards. Had a few beers with Bill and his mates at Grafton RSL and he told me that he refuses to write letters so gave me money to pass on to the Rats of Tobruk and the Pioneer Asociations so I have to write. What you could literally call "passing the buck". Bill is fortunately still enjoying good health. Also reckons he has not had a Pioneer News for some time. We all met after several races in the appropriate place and actually had a "Mini Reunion".

5. CLIFF CORBETT — Did not meet up with Cliff

until the following Wednesday, South Grafton Cup Day, and also at the races. Cliff still does not receive the Pioneer News and this may be partly my fault. I had met him previously on several trips to Grafton

when he gave me his address and I was under the impression I left it with you when I was in Sydney last time for Anzac Day. After the War Cliff (original B. Coy) had a property in Queensland for several years but later came to Grafton where he had a Taxi but has been retired now for a couple of years. Reckons he had driven thousands of people to Grafton races but had never been on the course until this year. He reckons his only outings are to the doctor, the pathologist and occasionally to hospital However, he is endeavouring to get himself fit enough to travel to Scone in September so that he and Myrtle can do a baby sitting job for No. 2 son Greg and his wife. No. 1 son Brian and family are domiciled in Young whilst daughter Anne and family are residents of Wallalong near Maitland. We had a good yarn and Sid was pleased to hear about his old mates in Grafton.

8. On Friday, July 26, 1985 the day after I arrived home, I attended the 50th Anniversary Dinner of Stockton Sub Branch RSL and as soon as I walked in I spotted another familiar face hiding behind a schooner and one I had not seen for some time. It was Max "Slim" Wilson. Slim joined the 2/1st in 1943 (I think) at the age of 17 and still retains the same figure as when he joined the army. I'd like to know how they do it! He recalled the other name he was known with in the unit "Pull Through", a very apt description which he reckons was given to him by Merv. Rees from Dorrigo. Loves a beer and spends a fair bit of time (and money) at Stockton RSL. He looked a million dollars. We had quite a yarn and as the night wore on we heard that hearty laugh which anybody who knew Slim in the Battalion, would recall.

He can manage without the artificial legs to get in and out of his car. He has hopes of going to the Brisbane Reunion with Larry Robson. However he looks good, is cheerful enough and heppy in his environment but I'm sure he would appreciate a visit if any of his mates are passing that way

On the way through I wandered around Macksville and dropped in to the RSL in the hopes of seeing Ray Horne or "Bombo" Reynolds but no luck.

Locally I see Don Crookes occasionally in Mayfield. He is now living at Beresfield

I regularly see Jack Bertram and Dick Sedden, both are well. Dick has got over his problem which stopped us from getting to Sydney last Anzac Day but we will make it next year. Dick has passed the 78 mark and is still living on his own but is going OK and I have a beer or two with him at least once a week, generally at the Gallipoli Legion Club of which I am still President.

You have probably been informed of the passing of both Ted Simpson (A Coy, HQ Coy) and Ewen (Nuggett) Laurie (C Coy) both old originals. I conducted the funeral service (ex-service portion) on behalf of the Rats of Tobruk on both occasions and expressed the sympathy of 2/1, 2/2 Pioneer Bn Association to their wives and families on both occasions
